Northern Region Highlights

Northern Region Officers focused on ice fishing patrols during this reporting period. Dozens of fishing inspections were made, and their presence was well received. Summonses were issued for undersize pickerel, undersize crappies and several overlimit of panfish cases. Northern Region Officers were also able to join the New Jersey State Police and other local law enforcement agencies for a one-day ice rescue training at Lake Hopatcong. Officers began the course learning about the effects of hypothermia and ended the class with training in escaping the cold water.

CPO C. Sikora was proactive during the trapping season and inspected many trappers in his patrol area. Due to his proactive approach, he returned to several areas where inspections were made and located a beaver trap that was not removed after the season closed. Summonses were issued for trapping beaver during the closed season and failure to check traps within a 24-hour period.
