



Statewide Gene Flow Project Update

Beginning in January 2018, a 5-year study is underway by the CHANJ team to assess the functional connectivity of New Jersey's landscape and the impacts that habitat

fragmentation and roads may be having on our terrestrial mammal species. More than 60 volunteers from all across the state are helping us collect DNA samples - mostly from road-killed animals - for genetic analysis. So far a total of 683 samples from 22 different mammal species have been collected.
