- Possession of a valid Trapping License is required to trap and must be openly displayed on back and cannot be covered by a pack or harness.



Trapping Regulations

See General Hunting Regulations, page 22.

Anyone applying for a trapping license must show a previous resident trapping license from this or any state or a Trapper Education Course Completion Card. Trapper Education courses are offered in the spring and fall. To enroll in a Trapper Education Course, go to dep.nj.gov/njfw/hunting/trappingseason-information/. See page 66.

The trapping license (including farmers) must be visibly displayed on outer clothing (not covered by a pack or harness) while trapping. In addition to a Trapping License, additional permits may be required depending on the furbearer to be trapped. A Rifle Permit is required when using a .22 caliber rifle to dispatch trapped animals other than muskrat. See 2024–25 Trapping Seasons table on page 67 for seasons and bag limits.

The following wildlife management areas are closed to all beaver and otter trapping as well as for using cable restraints for coyote, fox, opossum, raccoon and skunk until 6 a.m. on Jan. 1: Assunpink, Berkshire Valley, Bevans (Millville), Black River, Clinton, Colliers Mills, Flatbrook-Roy, Glassboro, Greenwood Forest (incl. Howardsville tract), Heislerville, MacNamara (Tuckahoe), Mad Horse, Manahawkin, Manasquan River, Medford, Nantuxent, Peaslee, Pequest, Port Republic, Stafford Forge, Walpack, Whittingham and Winslow. Cage traps and encapsulating traps may be used on these WMAs beginning at 6 a.m. on Nov. 15.

Firearms

Licensed trappers may use a firearm to dispatch any captured furbearer except muskrat. Youth trappers under age 14 using any firearm to dispatch, must be accompanied by, and under the direct supervision of, a properly licensed adult, 21 or older. Trappers must carry written permission from the landowner or lessee to possess a loaded firearm within any 450-foot safety zone.

Permitted firearms include:

- + Air gun (.177 to .22 caliber) having a minimum muzzle velocity of 600 fps and using wadcutter, domed or pointed or hollow point pellets only. (Spherical BBs not allowed.) Use of an air gun does not require the possession of a Rifle Permit.
- Rimfire (.22 caliber) rifle using .22 short cartridge only. Possession of a valid Rifle Permit is required when using any rimfire rifle.

Harvest Reporting

All coyote harvests must be reported by 8 p.m. via the Automated Harvest Report System (AHRS), either online at NJFishandWildlife.com/ licensesalessite.htm or by phone at (855) 448-6865. The location data collected is similar to that used in reporting a deer harvest (DMZ, county, township). NJDEP Fish & Wildlife requests trappers to report all harvests of gray fox via the AHRS as with for coyote (see above). Red fox cannot be reported at this time.

Report All Furbearer Sightings

Furbearer species sightings are important to NJDEP Fish & Wildlife to estimate abundance and distribution of various furbearing mammals. Please report all sightings to dep.nj.gov/njfw/ furbearer-survey/.

Beaver and Otter Lottery. Permits

Application period: Oct. 1-31; may only apply for one beaver and/or one otter permit. Trappers who will only accept a permit for one zone should not fill in second or third choices. Successful beaver applicants are given the first opportunity for otter permits in their respective zone. Permit award notification will begin on or before Nov. 2, 2024. Award pickup will begin November 4, 2024. Permits MUST be claimed by 11:59 p.m. on Sunday, Dec. 1, 2024. Unclaimed permits will be sold over the counter, first-come, first-served. Application fees for unclaimed permits are not refunded. Over-thecounter permit sales begin 10 a.m. on Wednesday, Dec. 4, 2024 at all license agents and online at NJFishandWildlife.com/licensesalessite.htm. For permit availability, see website above.

Beaver and otter permit holders will receive a packet regarding mandatory otter carcass surrender, check-in station date and locations, and NJDEP Fish & Wildlife staff contacts if you wish to check your catch before the actual registration date. Please remember to:

- · Report your harvest daily via the AHRS (online at NJFishandWildlife.com/licensesalessite.htm or by phone at 1(855) 448-6865).
- Make every attempt to properly flesh and stretch
- + Bring your otter carcass. If you caught an otter while beaver trapping but didn't have an otter permit, the entire animal must be surrendered, pelt on.

Legal Trap Types

- All trap sets must be tagged either with trapper's name and address, trap ID number or trapper's CID.
- · Tags on beaver and otter sets must be clearly visible above the water or ice.
- Relaxing lock for cable restraints are those that stop tightening when the animal stops pulling against the restraint. Cam-locks and spring-assisted locks are prohibited.
