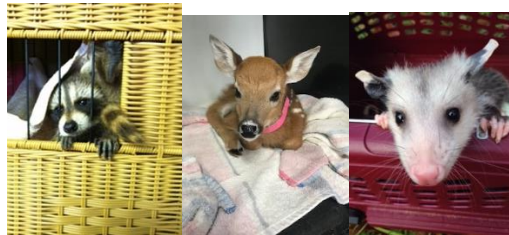

Antler Ridge Wildlife Sanctuary is a wildlife rehabilitation center that provides care to orphaned or injured wildlife. We are licensed by the state of New Jersey to care for bear, fawns, raccoons, skunks, opossums, squirrels, rabbits, woodchucks and other small mammals. The Sanctuary is a 120 acre preserved farm located in Warren County, NJ. It is a 501c3 nonprofit organization, supported entirely by public donations and volunteers.

- To provide care and treatment to sick, injured or orphaned wild animals
- To rehabilitate them back to their wild state so they can be returned to the wild
- To actively educate the public to care for the ecosystems and support the environment in which they live and the wildlife they share it with
- To protect and preserve our native lands for the future wildlife habitat

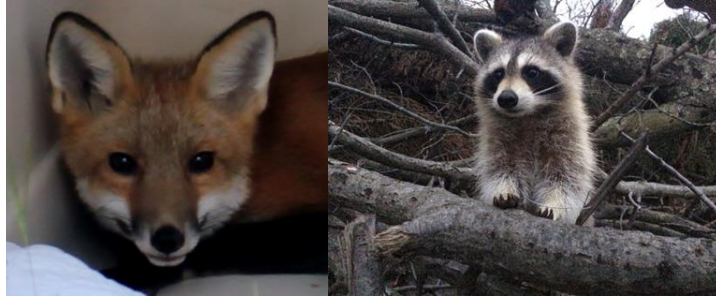

The Center cares for injured, ill, and displaced native wildlife, providing medical treatment and a temporary refuge prior to release back into an appropriate wild habitat.

We are state and federally licensed facility-accepting birds, mammals and reptiles from the central New Jersey area. All services provided by the Center are free of charge to those who bring animals in need of care. Donations are appreciated.

Our rescue facility sits on almost 80 acres of preserved and protected forest, an ideal environment for all the stages of rehabilitation in a supportive natural environment. We rescue and rehabilitate orphaned and injured wildlife, provide medical attention, veterinary care, neonatal care and often round the clock nursing care to our more critical patients. Our dedicated team strives to meet all of their needs through every stage of rehabilitation and provides daily enrichment to equip all of our wild patients with the skills and tools needed to be successfully released or reintroduced back into their native environment. In rare cases, to provide sanctuary for those few, who, for one reason or another, cannot be released. We are an all volunteer, NJ 501c3 Non Profit Organization and we receive no state or federal funding.

We rely on volunteers, donations and community support to continue saving lives. We provide a 24 hour hotline to the public for wildlife emergencies.

Licensed since 1996. Our goal is to give the best outcome to any animal that comes to us. We do many off-site rescues, such as animals tangled in nets, stuck in drainage grates, traveling in car engines and falling through a ceiling into a living space of a home, just to name a few. We have a list of 30 volunteers willing to participate in rescues after receiving a text message describing the help needed. We often transport animals we are not licensed for to facilities in Medford and Delaware.

We answer many calls regarding wildlife in attics, crawl spaces, chimneys and sheds. Luckily we are able to refer those calls to a removal person that will bring all animals to us, not dump them in unfamiliar places sometimes injured, distressed and often leaving babies behind. We offer live traps to homeowners willing to do the removal themselves, but require that animal come to us once trapped. Many calls require education, such as getting the proper galvanized trash can with a tight fitting lid, or keeping trash in a garage until pickup day, just simple solutions that allow the animal to remain in its familiar area.

Almost all wildlife are soft released from walk-in caging at various locations, and if possible returned to the place they came from (if they were the non-target animal trapped or if nursing). Release sites have man-made shelters, such as squirrel and raccoon houses in the trees, so the release can be gradual even after the door is open. The last couple years our intake numbers have jumped from about 350 to well over 800 due to the lack of new rehabbers, loss of those once licensed and our ongoing efforts to get trapped animals brought to us and not dumped.

We invite donation collectors to view our Facebook page, Wildlife Aid, which has the profile picture of red fox.

MOST NEEDED: paper towels, trash bags, laundry detergent

Any unsalted nuts, sunflower seeds or corn

Dog or cat food, canned or kibble

Most of the other items we use are bought in bulk and that allows the dollar to go much further than purchasing a small amount, so that is why such items as Esbilac are not included in this list.

Purpose of the organization:

Woodlands Wildlife Refuge, Inc. (Woodlands) is a wildlife rehabilitation facility dedicated to receiving, rehabilitating, and releasing orphaned and injured wildlife and educating the public about wildlife habits and habitats. New Jersey's wild and human communities will both benefit from the ongoing efforts of Woodlands Wildlife Refuge. Annually we serve over 800 members of the general public state wide which results in the intake of over 1700 animals. Our wildlife advice hotline is available 7 days a week and is used annually by thousands of people looking for assistance with orphaned and injured wildlife or wildlife concerns. Annually we provide over 30 educational programs to a variety of community organizations.

Since its inception in 1986 over 20,000 animals have been cared for. Woodlands is recognized internationally for its black bear rehabilitation and release program which it initiated in 1995. As the only facility in the state licensed to rehabilitate endangered venomous snakes and endangered bobcats, and as the primary bear rehabilitation facility, the services we provide are essential to the general public's unexpected encounters with wildlife. The Division of Fish and Wildlife, animal professionals, and New Jersey's wildlife depend on our services. In fact, in just the last few years, animal admissions have doubled. Despite this, Woodlands has remained determined to never turn away an animal in need, and to continued growth to meet those needs.
