AMENDMENT TO THE TRI-COUNTY WATER QUALITY MANAGEMENT PLAN

Public Notice

Take notice that on AUG 1 3 1997 , pursuant to the provisions of the New Jersey Water Quality Planning Act, N.J.S.A. 58:11A-1 et seq., and the Statewide Water Quality Management Planning rules (N.J.A.C. 7:15-3.4), an amendment to the Tri-County Water Quality Management Plan was adopted by the Department of Environmental Protection (Department). amendment was submitted on behalf of Jevic Transportation Company (Jevic). The amendment identifies the Jevic property as sewer service area of the Beverly Sewerage Authority (BSA) Sewage Treatment Plant (STP). The Jevic site is located along Creek Road in Delanco Township, Burlington County at Block 2000, Lots 10, 11B, 13.02, 13H1, 13H2, and 13H3. The existing Jevic buildings are served by a septic system which has been outgrown by the growth of the company. The estimated existing daily wastewater design flow from the site is 8,800 gallons per day. Jevic has recently purchased additional land adjacent to their existing site. This land will also be served by the sewer connection to the BSA STP. The projected wastewater flow from a future 50,000 square foot addition would be 5,000 gallons per day for a total wastewater flow from the Jevic site of 13,800 gallons per day. The Jevic property is not adjacent to the existing BSA STP sewer service area in Delanco Township. This amendment will not allow properties which are located between the Jevic site and the existing sewer service area to connect to the sewer system. However, Delanco Township plans to address the properties between the Jevic site and the existing BSA sewer service area as part of their cooperative wastewater management planning process with the BSA. The BSA STP discharges to the Delaware River and has adequate capacity to serve the Jevic site.

This amendment represents only one part of the permit process and other issues will be addressed prior to final permit issuance. Additional issues which were not reviewed in conjunction with this amendment but which may need to be addressed may include, but are not limited to, the following: antidegradation; effluent limitations; water quality analysis; exact locations and designs of future treatment works (pump stations, interceptors, sewers, outfalls, wastewater treatment plants); and development in wetlands, flood prone areas, designated Wild and Scenic River areas, or other environmentally sensitive areas which are subject to regulation under Federal or State statutes or rules.
